A Weekly Synthesis of Global Health Policies and Structural Reforms

I. EXECUTIVE OVERVIEW & ANALYSIS

Introduction Summary: The weekly International Health Policies (IHP) newsletter starts its September cycle under editor Kristof Decoster, introducing *Deccan Dispatches*, a new quarterly column providing a southern Indian practitioner's lens on global health [1]. The upcoming global health agenda is dense, featuring the PABS negotiations in Geneva, the annual UNGA meeting, and the UN High-level Meeting on Pandemic Prevention, Preparedness and Response (PPPR) [3]. The ongoing Ebola emergency in the DRC acts as a stark, worrying backdrop for these discussions. Decoster highlights the challenge of 'polycrisis,' where competing urgent crises (from conflicts to the climate emergency detailed in the new UNEP report) dilute policymaker attention and disrupt the traditional 'all hands on deck' response [4, 5]. Meanwhile, major global health reforms face systemic barriers, highlighted by Gen Z-led protests against corruption, civil society watchdog constraints under 'America First' bilateral funding, and severe bilateral aid spending cuts planned by the US Trump administration [6, 7].

Featured Article: Global Health's Great Derangement

In the maiden *Deccan Dispatches*, Dr. Prashanth NS argues that global health suffers from its own 'great derangement'—a failure of culture and imagination reminiscent of Amitav Ghosh's critique of literary fiction's inability to represent the true scale of climate catastrophe [8, 10]. Global health financing structures have bred 'grant-fiction': unimplementable proposal-writing aimed to impress rather than resolve actual problems [10]. Standard funder frameworks prioritize 'global' scale and macro-projects, which relegates critical, small-scale local action, destroys domestic ownership, and benefits Northern institutions over local actors [10, 11]. True 'scale' is not a funder's blueprint but is achieved when local communities, NGOs, and citizens coalesce passion and trust in their neighborhoods [11]. In low-income settings, 'global' agendas like climate change are frequently sidelined for proximate local needs (water, sanitation, roads), while climate health research serves as academic knowledge tools rather than owned practice [11, 12]. To counter this, global health financing must adapt to fund locally held platforms, self-reliance, and Movements [12].

II. COMPREHENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS & SUBSECTION SUMMARIES

1. A Few Reads of the Week: Examines systemic reform as Gen Z protests challenge corruption and performative 'youth engagement' in WHO-convened governance and the Accra Reset [14]. Concurrently, critiques of the WHO's recent political defense highlight a mismatch between administrative 'survival language' and the urgent lack of transformative vision needed for future international health cooperation [15, 17].

2. Ebola Emergency DRC: Congo's deadliest Bundibugyo Ebola outbreak has crossed 3,000 deaths from over 6,180 cases, spreading to six provinces [19, 21]. CDC assessments show the national response lags far behind response targets on case detection, contact tracing, and lab testing [20]. Despite concerns from teachers, distance learning was dropped to keep students from falling behind [21], while children are noted to be late beneficiaries of countermeasures [22].

3. Pandemic Prevention, Preparedness, and Response (PPPR): The WHO Pandemic Hub in Berlin retrospective reveals it detected early signals of DRC's Ebola months before the declaration, yet failed to trigger alarms due to system gaps, leading to a major system overhaul [23, 24]. The hub's vulnerability is highlighted by Germany halving its funding [25]. Elsewhere, TWN warns that draft terms of reference for SPCIHR weaken State Party oversight and WHO accountability [25, 27], while Japan's GHIT Fund expands into pandemic R&D, backing rapid diagnostic tools for the Bundibugyo species [28, 29].

4. WHO Director-General Race: The Geneva Health Files offers a 5,000-word analysis mapping out the process, geopolitical tensions, and early contours of candidates vying in the upcoming WHO Director-General election [32].

5. More on Global Health Reform: Africa CDC was selected to represent regional health organizations on the Joint Task Force on Global Health Architecture Reform [33, 34]. Analysis of 67 reform proposals reveals a consensus towards country-led, systems-focused investments, but implementation questions persist around funding-based decision-making [37, 38]. Furthermore, a Lancet viewpoint calls on global health to reject 'technical neutrality'—which shields funding—and adopt a political economy approach enabling true accountability [39, 40]. Protests also rise against merging UN Women and UNFPA, which could dilute their distinct mandates [41].

6. Global Health Governance & Funding/Financing: BRICS health ministers established concrete machinery in Chandigarh, adopting an Operational Framework to target social determinants of health (SDH Action Council) rather than purely pharmaceutical responses [42, 43]. Concurrently, Pete Baker's IDA Health Window proposal is gaining traction but faces concerns about funding global public goods [47, 48]. Sweden's total halt of development aid to Liberia has dealt a severe hammer blow to postwar recovery and SRHR services [52, 53]. Criticisms also target the WHO Foundation for receiving a \$100k donation from an alcohol-tobacco retailer, DFS Group, undermining due diligence [58, 59], while the UK ringfences £137.5m for Product Development Partnerships [51, 52].

7. Global Tax Justice: The Center for Economic and Social Rights (CESR) has submitted recommendations on the UN Tax Convention's Zero Draft, arguing that tax rules must translate human rights into action by taxing high-net-worth individuals, embedding gender equality, and securing meaningful civil society participation [66, 67, 68].

8. Universal Health Coverage & Primary Health Care (UHC & PHC): A comprehensive WHO review investigates public-private collaboration in women's health, analyzing how private-sector engagement mirrors structural gaps long identified in the 1995 Beijing Platform for Action [68, 69].

9. Trump 2.0, US Global Health Strategy & Bilateral Health Agreements: Public Citizen analysis of bilateral agreements reveals a planned 59% US health funding reduction (\$2 billion) to 18 countries by 2030, with Rwanda facing a 97% cut [70, 71]. Recipient nations face strict co-financing mandates that preclude other donor contributions and trigger severe co-financing penalties [72, 73]. Concurrently, the State Department is shifting funds through hybrid contractor channels, leaving local groups as mere subcontractors [75, 76]. Namibia has rejected US renewed HIV funding demands for health data and specimen-sharing, citing sovereignty and privacy infringements [79, 80], while President Trump announced nine more drug pricing deals with foreign drugmakers [81].

10. Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs): For the Global Week for Action on NCDs, the NCD Alliance launched a case series examining PHC financing for NCD medicines in Colombia, Nepal, and Uganda [82, 83]. The THESUS-HF II study across 17 African countries outlines an epidemiological transition: while the acute heart failure cohort remains young with high mortality, hypertensive etiology fell while ischemic heart disease surged to 23.3% [85, 86]. Furthermore, a new Lancet series highlights maternal cardiovascular health, showing pre-eclampsia raises heart failure risk 3.5-fold [88]. Lastly, a landmark first universal heart attack definition reclassifies conditions more common in women (like coronary artery dissection) and lowers troponin diagnostic thresholds [90, 92, 93].

11. Commercial Determinants of Health: A worrying WHO analysis reveals tobacco-leaf production continues to increase in Africa by 9% while declining globally, with the continent's manufactured cigarette import bill more than doubling to US\$ 1.77 billion [94, 95].

12. Urban Health: A BMJ analysis by Kabir Sheikh and colleagues argues that rapidly growing cities carry heavy service delivery burdens without corresponding authority over financing, workforce planning, and national oversight [95, 96].

13. Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR): AU African Court Registrar Dr. Robert Eno confirmed that a conservative draft charter on 'family, sovereignty, and values' seeking to roll back rights was not proposed or scheduled by the AU [97, 98]. Meanwhile, Afghan lives are caught between competing Taliban and Western dogmas [98, 99], and young Africans are increasingly using AI chatbots for private, sensitive SRH queries, sparking concerns over privacy, accuracy, and safeguarding [99, 100].

14. Child Health: A devastating UNICEF report indicates that 20 million children aged 12 to 17 (one in five across 21 surveyed nations) were victims of technology-facilitated sexual abuse, predominantly through social media channels [101].

15. Planetary Health: UNEP's 'Limiting Overshoot' report warns global heating will hit at least 1.8°C, requiring rapid greenhouse gas and methane cuts rather than relying solely on carbon removal [5, 102, 103, 104]. El Niño is forecast to intensify into the largest event in 1,000 years [106]. An African push for a UN drought protocol was deferred [107], and Nepal has demanded climate compensation from large emitters after catastrophic flash floods caused \$5 billion in destruction, putting pressure on the underfunded U.N. Loss and Damage Fund [111, 113].

16. Artificial Intelligence & Health: Public health experts emphasize that Australia's draft AI legislation must carry health, equity, and climate lenses, warning that AI is becoming a determinant of health in its own right [115, 116]. Critics also call for future DSM editions to screen for social media algorithms' influence on eating disorders [116, 117].

17. Access to Medicines, Vaccines, and Health Technologies: A global mpox vaccine stockpile was launched, funded by Gavi and coordinated by the ICG [117, 118]. In South Africa, despite President Ramaphosa celebrating the rollout of the highly effective injectable HIV preventive lenacapavir, extremely high costs have restricted uptake to under 47,000 people, far below the advisor-recommended 1.7 million annually [119, 120]. Concurrently, UNAIDS and SADC launched a major strategic exchange with China to boost regional production [121, 122].

18. Miscellaneous: Economists critique a prominent global justice report for ignoring that most Global South workers earn livelihoods in informal employment, proposing 'pre-distribution' policies instead [123, 124, 125]. Concurrently, the UN CERD committee issued a landmark ruling that countries are legally obliged to consider comprehensive slavery reparations under the 1965 convention [126, 127], while Germany faces concerns over 'airport malaria' deaths at Frankfurt airport [128, 129].
